


# **Pet Emergency Plan**

# Pack for your pets

Make sure you have everything you need for your pet(s) in your emergency kit. Each pet should also have their own grab-and-go bag. Include items such as:



Neck or head collar, leash, harness or muzzle



Treats, a favourite toy and a blanket



Pet carrier, cage or crate



Medications and basic first aid supplies



Pet food and water for three days to two weeks (or more)



Copy of vaccination records



Collapsible food and water dishes



Photos of your pet(s) with you and alone



Animals can become disoriented, frightened or aggressive in emergencies. Add items to your emergency kit to help calm your pet such as a towel with your scent on it. You may also need thick gloves to help you handle a panicked pet.

#### Pet emergency plan

You might need extra supplies based on what type of pet you have:



Cats? Dogs? You'll need a roll of poop bags or a small container of cat litter and a litter scoop



Bunnies or other caged pets? You'll need shavings for bedding and a hiding box




Reptiles? You may need a portable battery-operated heat lamp



Birds? You might need cuttlebone and grit

# Talk to your neighbours

Give your neighbour or a trusted friend a key to your home so they can get your pet if you're not home during an emergency. Tell them any likely hiding spots and where your pet's grab-and-go bag is located.

## Practice your plan

This helps everyone you live with, including your pet(s), know what to expect before, during and after an emergency.



Have crates and carriers easily accessible. Practice getting your pet(s) in and out of their carrier at different times of day so they know what to expect.

#### **Additional resources**
